Happy New Year folks!!! As the holiday season - from Thanksgiving all the way through New Year's Eve , with all the gatherings of family, friends, and Associations, the delicious foods and deserts, finally comes to an end, I take a deep breath and say WHEW that was great but I'm glad it's over. The calories will linger a bit longer.

The past few months have been unseasonably warm with temperatures 10 -20 degrees or more above normal, which allows for the bees to fly on most days, and the forecast promises the same throughout the winter with maybe a few heavy snows. These conditions also allow for the bees to consume their winter food stores at a much higher rate. After making sure the bees had enough food stored away in late November for a normal winter, my biggest concern is that the bees may still run out of food, long before they normally would in February or March. Having said that, I began again, feeding liquid syrup 2:1 ratio of sugar to water on Dec. 20-21 in order to help them build up their food stores once again, maybe switch over to the hard candy before the weather turns worse. Common wisdom is that the bees will consume about 25 pounds of food during January. I urge you to check your bees and their food supply; the bees will thank you later by surviving. Keep in mind, that if we do get the predicted heavy snows, you will need to make sure their entrance is cleared to allow ventilation.

January is also the time to pay membership dues and to order your equipment for the coming season, it will give you plenty of time to build and paint. It is a great time to catch up on reading the latest bee magazines or books that you were too busy to read during the holidays. You could also sign up for our 21st annual Beginning Beekeeping Workshop to be held on March 12, at the Lakewood Oaks Golf Club in Lee's Summit. My wife and I took three beginning beekeeping classes before we had bees, one in September, early December, and March. It's not that we're slow learners, we wanted to get different perspectives, and that's what our Beekeeping Workshop offers with all the different topics and speakers. Please join us for our General meeting - January 10, 2:30 pm and the Nuc Initiative meeting on January 21, 7:00 pm. **Our meetings will now be held at Bass Pro** (lower level) in the Conservation Room. Thank you, Bob.

Many thanks to Cathy Misko, Past President of the Midwestern Beekeepers for her years of dedicated service to this association. Reprinted here is her final address that she gave at the December meeting:

All healthy organisms reproduce and it is important to have fresh ideas and new blood. When the bees reproduce and swarm, the workers quit feeding the queen so she loses weight helping her to fly—They push her out and she takes off with about 30,000 bees leaving a fresh new queen to carry on. I will not take 30,000 with me and unfortunately I have not lost any weight! How the organization has benefited me—thank you from my whole heart. I hope that the new president and board will grow and benefit as I have.

The honey bee produces only 1/12 teaspoon—just a drop in her life time but it sweetens much. I have made 2 sided *Honey Drops* (I heated a jewel and pressed it into cold butter to make an impression. I then took a medical dropper, filled the impression with water, and re-measured how much water the impression held. It held .4 ml which is the equivalent to 1/12 of a teaspoon.) These are gifts to remind you that it only takes a drop of honey to sweeten or help another in this world.



Honey Drops: One side resembles **you** and the other side is symbolic for **Midwestern** or another in your life that helps along the way. Thank you and continue to invest in each other.
